What is a Regional Mobility Authority? (RMA)

- County-wide Independent Local Government Agency (Political Subdivision)
- <u>REGIONALLY</u> focused transportation development/implementation entity
- Works with <u>LOCAL</u> TxDOT District... a "TxDOT District w/in a TxDOT District"

Brazos County Regional Mobility Authority





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- County-wide Independent Local Government Agency (Political Subdivision)
- **<u>REGIONALLY</u>** focused transportation development/implementation entity
- Works with **LOCAL** TxDOT District... a "TxDOT District w/in a TxDOT District
- <u>NO</u> taxing authority
- Has powers of Eminent Domain



What is a Regional Mobility Authority? (RMA)

- Not limited to only roadways
- Encourages LOCAL CONTROL of building and operating transportation facilities in the region
- Other counties can be added after creation
- Projects could extend into other adjacent counties



Types of RMA Projects

- Roadways
- Airport/Aviation Facilities
- Pedestrian/Bike Facilities
- Public Utility Facilities
- Transit Systems/Public

Transportation

- Parking Facilities
- Toll Roadways
- Rail
- Bridges
- Ferries



How is an RMA created?

STEP 1:

County Commissioner's court must authorize the creation of the RMA

STEP 2:

Petition for creating an RMA is prepared and submitted to TTC

- Benefit the region, and of the state for the "increase of their commerce and prosperity, and for the health, living conditions and public safety"
- Reviewed by TTC & TxDOT



How is an RMA created?

STEP 3:

After a successful review, the TTC will issue a minute order creating the RMA

STEP 4:

County accepts the TTC minute order and creates the RMA Board which is comprised of:

- Odd number of directors, appointed by Commissioner's Court
- Presiding officer, appointed by Governor



Why create an RMA?

- TxDOT assistance with RMA startup
- Obtaining a tool which can help solve some of our transportation problems
- Demonstrates to Brazos County is <u>Proactive, Organized, and Engaged</u> in solving Transportation issues.
- Local Control Commissioner's Court decides on how to comprise the board
- Not a taxing authority
- Allows for the opportunity to increase funding for construction
- Takes the Lead to complete a project
- Can complete many types of projects
- Works collaboratively



Summary

-Provides the community with another tool to utilize, which gives the region additional options which we do not currently have.

-Gives College Station/Bryan and Brazos County as a whole more visibility.

-Demonstrates to TxDOT and State we are **<u>Proactive</u>**, **<u>Organized</u>**, and <u>**Engaged**</u> and that we are doing all we can to solve our own problems.
