#### **Birth to Five Head Start 2020-21 Overview**

Head Start: 249 students

Early Head Start: 96 students, 11 expectant mothers

Children not served: 10 Head Start students

#### **ERSEA** (Eligibility, Recruitment, Selection, Enrollment, Attendance)

<u>Strength</u>: Partnered with technology to launch platform for families to securely upload application documents; attendance remained high even during Covid (87% HS and 78% EHS)

Focus area: Eliminate "gap" children

## **Education and Disabilities**

<u>Strength</u>: EHS provided monthly educational bags for home use; HS had successful adoption of a new curriculum; 51 students served with a diagnosed disability

<u>Focus Area</u>: Fidelity to curriculum and equity in instruction in all classrooms; working with SPED to create more seamless referral process

## **Instructional Coaching**

<u>Strength</u>: 241 hours of coaching, mentoring, classroom and behavioral support for Head Start teachers and assistants

<u>Focus Area</u>: Addition of a Spanish speaking coach for CLASS assessment, observations and support of our Bilingual classrooms.

## **Health and Safety**

<u>Strength</u>: 88% of HS students received a health exam and 89% received a dental exam; Created new health and safety checklist based on policies and procedures

<u>Focus Area</u>: Increasing health and safety education for families; create health services guide for staff

## **Mental Health Services**

<u>Strength</u>: Increased family access to mental health services through partnership with Bilingual therapist from Oakwood Roots Collaborative

<u>Focus Area</u>: Ensuring families are aware of the mental health services; removing any barriers to service

## **Family Engagement**

<u>Strength</u>: More than 300 services were provided to families; 275 families completed at least one goal; 100% of families reported that EHS encouraged them to play with and read to their child daily

<u>Focus Area</u>: Return to in-person family engagement; Father engagement was down 30% due to cancellation of activities such as soccer and Family, Fun and Field day.

#### **Program Management and Governance**

<u>Strength</u>: Ability to serve more HS eligible children with partnership between Head Start and Pre-K (57 students); Instructional Assistant pay adjustment to compensate for required education

<u>Focus Area</u>: Continue to increase home campus placement through purchase of portables with additional ARP funds

#### Birth to Five Program Goals 2019-2024

#### **Program Goal: Increase placement on home campus**

2018-2019, 68% of students placed on home campus

2019-2020, 70% of students placed on home campus

2020-2021, 80% of students placed on home campus

2021-2022, 84.6% of students place on home campus

### **Transportation**

<u>Strength</u>: \$240,000 Grant was awarded for child safety restraints to ensure bus safety

<u>Focus Area</u>: Provide support for families within the 2 mile school radius without reliable transportation

## **Community Assessment/Response COVID-19**

<u>Strength</u>: Additional funding from the OHS to support flexible programming during the pandemic such as access to technology and reliable WIFI; grant from City of College Station (CDBG Cares Act funds)

<u>Focus Area</u>: Expanding collaborations between Early Head Start and the community

#### **Survey Feedback from stakeholders**

<u>Strength</u>: Dedicated staff; resources for at home learning and outdoor classroom expansion

<u>Focus Area</u>: Begin exploring options for an Early Education Center
