# RECORD VOTE ELECTS WOMAN TO CITY COMMISSION

## Marshall Tells Russia Of Withdrawal From China

### FOUR MEMBERS PRESENT BODY ARE RETAINED

Lucy Harrison First Woman Elected In City History

1395 VOTES CAST

New Commission Will Take Office On April 11

Bryan citizens, establishing a new voting record for a city commission election, Tuesday elected a woman, Mrs. Lucy Harrison, to the commission for the first time in the history of the commission-manager form of government. As a matter of fact this is the first time a woman ever has been elected to office in the history of the city.

The other members of the top five all are members of the present commission, E. R. Bryant, Roy Vick, Roland Dansey and Ivan Langford. A total of 1395 votes were cast, and the next highest vote in a city commission election was cast in 1935, when 913 votes were polled. Less than 10 votes were thrown out, and most of those were disqualified because the voter failed to scratch all but five names, or scratched five and left the others open. Although in these cases the intention might have been to vote for the five names mentioned, election officials could not be sure this was the intention.

The vote, by absentee as follows: Bryant, 773; Vick, 721; Dansey, 722; Langford, 696; Harrison, 685; George E. Adams, 611; Jack W. Lester and Earl Parson, 213 each; C. B. Moonbeam, 511; R. H. Doney Jr., 493; W. Baner, Oct. 24.

The vote will be canvassed at the meeting of the old commission, Friday night, April 11. Then the newly elected commissioners will be sworn in, will organize and take over.

An interesting side light on the election was the production, made by F. L. Henderson. He picked the five winners and had them jaded correctly, except that he placed Dansey ahead of Vick and the latter led the former. He had the eleven listed as follows: Bryant, Dansey, Vick, Langford, Harrison, Lester, Adams, Orr, Parsons, Doney and Moonbeam.

**Heavy Late Vote**  
The voting was comparatively steady in the morning and then a lull set in until the hour, when it picked up. Voters began to come in about four o'clock and until the polls closed there was a slow but steady

### WHAT ABOUT SOVIET

Had Asked Molotov For Statement On China Deal

MOSCOW, April 2 (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall has informed the Foreign Soviet Minister Molotov that when the general withdrawal of United States troops in China is completed only 6,000 military and naval personnel will remain and said this will be at the request of the Chinese government.

He said American forces had retrained 1,000,000 Japanese in their homeland from China. He added "as for the disposition of an estimated 700,000 Japanese taken in Manchuria by the Soviets, I have no information."

See Marshall had sent Molotov a letter March 21 asking an exchange of information on the status of the fulfillment of obligations concerning China.

MOSCOW, April 2 (AP)—An apparent compromise in French policy appeared likely in the council of foreign ministers as France's Foreign Minister Molotov agreed to the British proposal for establishing a provisional government for Germany by stages.

### County Revenue From Car, Truck Tag Sales Gains

- Mary Ann (Gardner) Parker was born in 1916 in Waco, TX.
- She attended the University of Colorado and the University of Texas.
- She was a resident of Bryan for 36 years, married to M. Lawrence Parker and had two children. Her husband "said his greatest service to Bryan and Brazos County was to bring Mary Ann to Bryan".
- Mary Ann was the founder and president of the Bryan Boys Club and the Bryan Girls Club and many other community organizations.
- She was instrumental in the fight to allow women to attend Texas A&M University; she was one of three Bryan women who filed suit in 1959 to gain entry into the college. The suit was ultimately unsuccessful but helped pave the way for women to gain entry to TAMU beginning in June 1963.

## Barnett, Chavarria in Bryan runoff

The former athletic director at Texas A&M University spurred past two challengers to win a seat on the Bryan City Council Saturday while a local grocery store clerk led another field of three in a council race that will be decided by runoff on April 26.

Marvin Tate, a well-known A&M sports figure, captured 51 percent of the vote in the Place 4 race to put him over his two challengers, Hayward "Big Pete" Peterson and Bill Pittman.

Helen Chavarria, a grocery clerk and the wife of a Bryan policeman, and Hugh C. Barnett Jr., a traffic supervisor with the Babcock and Wilcox Co., will face each other in a runoff election tentatively slated for April 26.

Chavarria received 38 percent of the vote to 33 percent for Barnett. The third candidate in the race, developer John Mayfield, received only 28 percent.

In the other two Bryan council races, incumbent Peyton Waller and Bill B. Scasta each won with 53 percent of the vote.

Waller, the owner of a building materials supply firm, was re-elected to another term as Place 3 councilman over Pete Palasota, a teacher at the Stephen F. Austin School. Scasta's opponent, Tom Salamon, is the plant manager of the Norton Co.

Although election day fell on

Easter weekend, voter turnout was surprisingly high. A total of 3,730 persons — 24 percent of the 23,598 registered voters — went to the polls Saturday. In last year's council election, only 18 percent of the registered voters cast ballots, and that turnout was the highest since 1976.

Tate, the candidate with the most "name recognition" in the council contests, said he couldn't pinpoint the reasons for his victory.

"I was obviously hoping to win without a runoff," he said, "but with three good candidates that could have easily happened.

"I really didn't have a feeling for the race in the past week or so. All I was talking to was my friends — and they just tell you what you want to hear. I really don't think there were any major issues. Some people tried to make an issue of zoning, but the people were talking about streets and parks.

"My first priority when I get on the council will be to find out what's going on. In any new job, there should be a period of training."

In Tate's race, Peterson, a science teacher at the Stephen F. Austin School, received 26 percent of the vote and Pittman, the owner of Twin City Furniture, got 22 percent. Tate's seat on the council, unlike the others at stake Saturday, will be up for grabs again next year because Henry

Seale resigned that post to run for mayor.

Scasta, who will replace mayor-elect Ron Blatchley as the Place 1 councilman, attributed his victory to his name recognition in the city.

"I've been in Bryan so long," he said, "and people know I will be here for a long time to come. If Tom had been here this long he might have won. Tom's a real good man, though, and if I would have lost to him, I really wouldn't

consider it a loss (for the city).

"The first thing I'm going to do when I get in office is look at all the facts and figures on our streets, parks and utility computer. The momentum on improving our parks is already going, but we'll have to get going on the other issues."

Scasta felt that he survived a late challenge from Salamon.

"I could tell he was gaining on me," he said.

## Chavarria defeats Barnett for Bryan City Council post

Helen Chavarria became the only woman on the Bryan City Council Tuesday when she defeated Hugh C. Barnett Jr. by 221 votes out of 3,121 ballots cast.

Chavarria beat Barnett by polling 1,671 votes — 53.5 percent — to Barnett's 1,450, or 46.5 percent. City officials said turnout was relatively high for a single race runoff election, with 15 percent of the city's voters casting ballots.

At a campaign party for about 50 friends and supporters, Chavarria thanked the "fine people of Bryan" for her victory.

"I'm ecstatic," she said. "It takes great citizens to make a great city, and Bryan is a great city."

Chavarria pledged to work with the City Council in finding solutions to the city's problems, especially its deteriorating streets and inadequate park system.

"Those problems are going to be looked into," she said. "There will be a certain training period, when I'll need to familiarize

Kandy Rose flipped through the photo album on her dining room table and reflected on the snapshots that captured her decade on the Bryan City Council.

Speaking softly and without a trace of regret, Rose recounted with pride her occasionally tumultuous role in helping shape the city's recent history. And yet the tears glistening in
