

Special Session Legislative Update & Matters Related to School Finance

Governor's Third Called Special Session

Included in the Proclamation:

- Educational Savings Accounts
- Creating a criminal offense for illegal entry into this state from a foreign nation and authorizing all licensed peace officers to remove illegal immigrants from Texas.
- Increasing the penalties for certain criminal conduct involving the smuggling of persons or the operation of a stash house.
- Providing more funding for the construction, operation, and maintenance of border barrier infrastructure.
- Legislation concerning public safety, security, environmental quality, and property ownership in areas like Colony Ridge development in Liberty County, Texas.
- Legislation prohibiting COVID-19 vaccine mandates by private employers.

NOT Included in the Proclamation:

- Public School Funding Increase
- Teacher Pay Increase

Gov. Greg Abbott says special legislative session on "school choice" coming in October

The governor promised political consequences if lawmakers cannot pass legislation allowing for publicly subsidized school vouchers before March primaries.


Funds remain unspent without new legislation

No Education Funding on the Governor's Call

Texas ranks in the bottom 10 states for per-pupil funding of public school students

 \$4,000+ below the national average per student. Adjusting the basic allotment for inflation since 2019 (14.5%) would mean about a \$900 increase.

Financial Matters

Bryan ISD continues to invest in our Teachers

- 3.8% Average annual increase in pay for Teachers from 2015-16 to present
- Not including one-time stipends of:
 - 0.5% retention stipend in 2020-21
 - 2% retention stipend in 2021-22
 - 4% retention stipend in 2022-23
 - 5% retention stipend in 2023-24
 - \$500-\$1500 longevity stipend in 2023-24 based on years of service in education

86% of the General Fund Budget is expended on Salaries & Benefits

Bryan ISD property tax rates have decreased:

- \$0.40 per \$100 of valuation from 2016 to 2023
- From a total rate of \$1.3500 to \$0.9492

Financial matters

School Safety Allotment

- Legislature-mandated armed personnel on every campus
- To pay for it legislature increased this allotment \$0.28 per Average Daily Attendance (ADA) and added \$15,000 per campus
- Estimated increase to Bryan ISD \$365,000 (total annual allotment \$505,000)
- Since 2017 Bryan ISD has increased the budget for School Resource Officers by over \$550,000 (total for 2023-24 is \$1,018,776)
- The increase included 2 additional officers (9 to 11) and
- Increased cost share with the City of Bryan (50% to 75%)

Thankfully the district received a \$1,000,000 donation from the Donald and Donna Adam Family Foundation to help with safety and security. This allows the District to cover the cost of the armed personnel for the first year (approximately \$700,000) without increasing the deficit budget further.
